APOGLA once again implemented a high impact community service project at the Los Angeles Regional Food Bank at City of Industry, CA last April 18. This was a boon to streamline operations to help fight food insecurity in the San Gabriel Valley. Thirty (30) active and dedicated alumni volunteers joined the task which was the maximum number required.

The members successfully packed 14000 emergency boxes with staple ingredients. *"Aside from accomplishing the objective,"* Chairperson Sis Hazel Hermoso commented, *"we were able to reconnect alumni brothers across diverse chapters."* She continued, *"Aside from that, we were able to strengthen the regional footprint of the fraternity."*

On that particular day, too, April 18, Saturday, APOGLA concurrently celebrated Easter and held its General Membership meeting at the Rosemead Masonic Lodge, Rosemead, CA.

The early morning sun hadn't quite cleared the horizon when I arrived at the food bank. Few minutes more, and the members of Alpha Phi Omega Greater Los Angeles (APOGLA) began gathering at the Los Angeles Regional Food Bank last Saturday. By 8:00 AM, the parking lot was buzzing with the kind of energy you only find when friends unite for a common cause.

While this has become a cherished annual tradition for APOGLA, each year brings a fresh perspective on why we do what we do. Following a 9:00 AM orientation, our team hit the floor, ready to transform a massive warehouse into a hub of productivity and purpose.

In Alpha Phi Omega, we often speak of our three core pillars. Not just printed on the shirts we were wearing, Last Saturday, those weren't just words - they were actions:

Leadership: From the moment tasks were assigned, leadership was on full display. It wasn't just about directing traffic; it was about the initiative taken by every member to ensure the workflow remained seamless. Whether it was assembly-line efficiency or troubleshooting a logistics hiccup, our members stepped up to guide the process.

Friendship: There is a unique bond formed through shared effort. Between the heavy lifting and the fast-paced packing, there were laughs, stories, and the strengthening of ties that define APOGLA. The work is physically demanding, but doing it alongside "brothers and sisters" makes the time fly and the "tiring" moments much lighter.

Service: This is the heartbeat of our organization. As we taped, filled, and stacked, we kept one thought at the center of our minds: The Box - The Heart of the Mission. Along side with other volunteers we were able to make a total of 1400 CSFP KITS, 24,300 lbs mandarin, 9,052 lbs lemons.

It is easy to focus on the physical exhaustion of a long shift on the warehouse floor. However, that fatigue is quickly replaced by a profound sense of satisfaction. Every box sealed represents a family fed, a senior supported, or a child who won't go to bed hungry. The true reward isn't just in the number of pallets we cleared; it's in the knowledge that our hands-on service translates into tangible relief for our neighbors in need. There is nothing more fulfilling than knowing our collective sweat and Saturday morning hours are being packaged into hope for the people of Los Angeles.

"The best way to find yourself is to lose yourself in the service of others."

As we look forward to next year, we carry with us the spirit of this weekend: tired feet, but very full hearts. Thank you brothers and sisters and the spouses who showed up and showed out for our community.

In Leadership, Friendship, and Service may we always be!

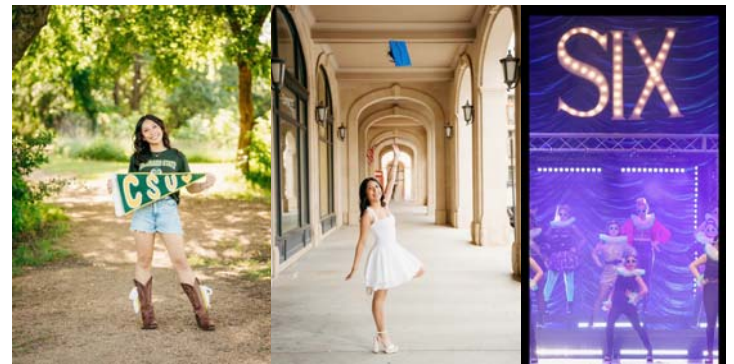
KYLEE RYAN RONDILLA

FROM MY POINT OF VIEW

As a person actively involved in civic, religious and fraternal engagement, it is a dizzying routine to attend to all social obligations. In Psychology, we learned that social obligation is a perceived pressure or expectations, often arising from the need to maintain connections or fulfill informal rules established by the community.

There are advantages and disadvantages associated with getting involved or being passive. Remember, an old cliché or expression that “No man is an island.” It basically means that human beings necessarily depend on one another. 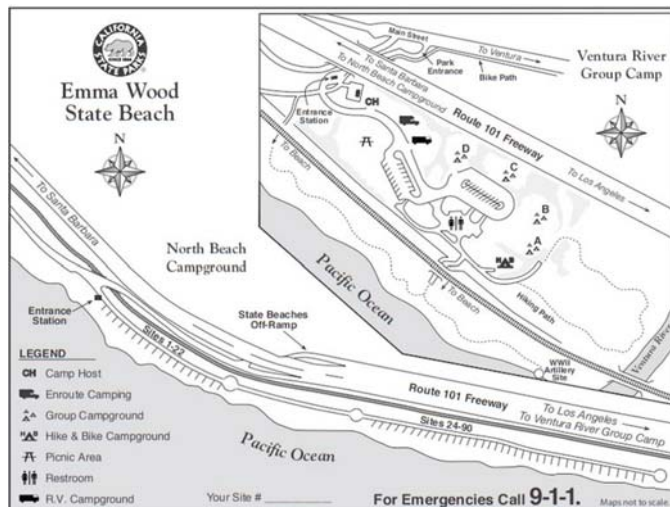
