This year, it was GLA's Team Eta stepping up to the plate of service.

Fun memories were reminisced at this camp, and new ones created this time. EWSB is a beachfront gem - one of Ventura County's most spectacular spots for unforgettable group camping experiences – and delivers the perfect mix of natural beauty, camaraderie, and coastal fun! Imagine waking up to the rhythmic crash of Pacific waves just steps from your tent with the periodic rumble of the Amtrak Surfliner trains drowning out the vehicular noise of America's Ventura Highway – Highway 101 and the Pacific Coast Highway, the salty breeze carrying laughter from brothers, sisters, family and friends, and golden California sunshine painting everything in warm hues. A Festive Philippine Heritage Night Baseball Game

Despite the uncertainty and many issues we are facing today globally like the war in Iran, escalating fuel prices, inflation and affordability - one thing is certain - we are resilient as a people like a bamboo tree.

I premised my manifestation because the Filipino Heritage Night baseball game on June 15 at Dodgers Stadium - has united us in Los Angeles not only among the huge Filipino compatriots - but the American people in general from all cultural background for this favorite American pastime.

The atmosphere was festive, a fiesta-like ambiance forgetting for a moment our challenging life's journey going through the traffic and parking woes at Dodgers Stadium, to watch the World Champion Team Dodgers against Tampa Bay Rays. The huge parking lot was filled with vehicles around the stadium. The multitude must be about 50 to 60,000 ardent, vociferous fans.

The enthusiastic crowd roared when our compatriot Jokoy, threw the ceremonial first pitch before the start of the game at 7:10 pm between the defending champion Dodgers and Tampa Bay Rays from St. Petersburg, Florida.

The Sunshine State team had a good start with a 2-0 in the first inning. This was followed by another home run in the second inning for a 3-0. Then Kyle Tucker hit a home run over the right field fence that brought two Dodgers to home plate that tied the score 3-3. In the seventh frame, pinch-hitter Miguel Rojas unleashed a solo homer above the left field stands. The motley home crowd rose to its feet with a deafening cheer. The Dodgers were never threatened after that with remarkable defense. And when the Dodgers couldn't score when two players were on the plates, my seatmate groaned "*sayang*" (too bad).

Some highlights of the game: Two-way star player Shohei Ohtani hit once, struck out twice and allowed to walk the first plate once. In the eight inning, Tampa Bay had eight hits while the Dodgers had only seven hits but still had the upper hand 4-3. Will Klein was relieved as pitcher by Alex Vesia in the seventh inning.

In between the games, Jokoy was seen on the screen imploring the crowd make a loud noise. If he thought it was not enough, he agitated "Get Louder. Scream." He told the throng, "I can't hear you."

A Fil-Am man wearing barong was even flashed on the huge screen. Filipino fans including kids were constantly shown on the monitor. And on cue from the organist, the multitude yell: "**CHARGE!**"

The weather was warm before I left our Cerritos home with my family. But I was shivering beginning at 8 pm when the temperature was hovering low.

We entered the entrance on the west side of the Chavez Ravine. Just 30 seconds before entering, the especially-tailor made Filipino jersey just ran out which was part of the ticket that we pre-paid. But my son relentlessly followed up with the Fans Services

Kiosk staff that he was entitled for the jersey. Lo and behold, at mid-game another Dodger staff came to our bleacher row and delivered five jerseys emblazoned with our Philippine flag patch on the right sleeve, the World Champion Dodgers logo on the left sleeve and the word *mabuhay* on the back of the jersey. I realized when I arrived home that the jersey design was patterned after our polo barong Tagalog. This jersey priced with an estimated price of \$100 is a rare collectible item.

At my age, I really don't relish anymore threading the traffic-choked Los Angeles freeways, queuing the long line, finding our parking space, weaving towards our assigned chairs. But for this Filipino Heritage Night, it was worth the hassle. The last time I was at Dodgers Stadium was in 2015 when my son surprisingly treated us to watch the Paul McCartney concert. Without giving me a hint, he just told me we'll have a dinner in Chinatown. Then all of a sudden, our SUV was going uphill until I saw the banner hanging: "Paul McCartney In Concert." It threw me off from my chair. He surprised me. He knew all along that I was fan of the Beatles. I first saw them perform at Rizal Coliseum in 1967. I just graduated from high school then.

For a trivia, the first time I participated in the Filipino Heritage Night was in 1991 when I threw the first ceremonial pitch along with a fellow community leader. I was invited then as the president of the Filipino-American Press Club of Los Angeles by the PR man of the Dodgers Organization. Those were the heydays and halcyon days of my life.

It was indeed a remarkable Filipino Heritage Night to reckon with. A rap song, "*Ako'y Filipino, Filipino*," echoed in the storied Dodgers Stadium. As a cultural ethnic group, the Dodgers Organization recognizes the power of our strength. - denino1951@gmail.com
